## LITTLE SHOP OF HORRORS

## The Story

Little Shop of Horrors is a gleefully gruesome musical adaptation of a 1960's dark comedy/horror film. In this story we meet Seymour Krelbourn, a young and naive florist's assistant employed at Mushnik's Florists, an unsuccessful flower shop located on Skid Row. Seymour's pathetic existence takes a turn for the better after he happens upon a strangely unique plant. He takes the plant in, names it Audrey II after his secret love interest, and nurtures it.

The plant begins to grow and brings success to Mushnik's shop increasing Seymour's worth to his employer and making him an instant celebrity. We soon learn, however, that Audrey II is not just any old plant but one with a mind and evil plan of its own.

Seymour allows his desire for fame, fortune and romance to seduce him into fulfilling Audrey II's peculiar need....a need to be fed human blood. Seymour begins by innocently feeding his own blood to the plant but eventually can't keep up to the plant's demands for "more, more...". He is then encouraged to secretly kill people who "deserve to die" (for various reasons) and feed them to Audrey II. In exchange, the plant promises to grant Seymour his every desire.

Audrey II lures Audrey into the shop, entangles her in its vines and begins to eat her. Seymour enters and tries desperately to save her but by the time he gets to her, Audrey is already dying. Seymour holds her closely and tells her about Audrey II's appetite for human blood. He also confesses to having sacrificed Orin (Audrey's abusive boyfriend) and Mushnick to appease the plant. Audrey insists that Seymour feed her to the plant. She believes that in caring for the plant, Seymour will also be caring for her, thereby allowing their love to bloom forever.

Audrey's death is the final straw for Seymour. Everything he has done has been for her. He decides to take care of the plant once and for all. Unfortunately for Seymour, in his attempt to destroy the plant he too is devoured. Audrey II's plan for world domination advances as representatives of World Botanical Enterprises visit the flower shop and take cuttings in order to propagate Audrey II. The story ends with all of Audrey II's victims warning the audience: "Look out, Here Comes Audrey II".

Little Shop of Horrors is an ecclectic piece of theatre as it combines various dramatic genres and themes. The developing relationship between Audrey and Seymour proves to be a true love story. Through this modern morality play, we see the effect of temptation as Seymour transforms from being innocent to evil, allowing himself to be coerced into murder by Audrey II. In the style of black comedy the audience is left unsettled by the success of Audrey II's twisted plan. We also see some stylistic devices used in Greek Tragedy as the "doo-wop" girls function as a sort of Greek chorus helping to re-cap and advance the story. Despite the dark story line, the various upbeat musical styles used throughout the show help to keep the spirit of the story light and even humourous.
