Type 3 - *Volunteering* – Organize volunteers and audiences to support the school and students. Provide volunteer opportunities in various locations and at various times.

Type 4 - *Learning at Home* – Involve families with their children on homework and other curriculum-related activities and decisions.

Type 5 - *Decision Making* – Include families as participants in school decisions, and develop leaders and representatives.

Type 6 – *Collaborate with the Community* – Coordinate resources and services from the community for families, students, and the school, and provide services to the community.

These six keys can be used to develop a comprehensive program to increase student success.
