Hi. I'm glad you are on! I thought someone was following me home today. It was really weird!

Don't you live in a safe neighborhood?



 Point to the words as you read. For older students, have them read to you.
- Draw attention to print that is in the environment (labels, signs, cereal boxes, etc...)
- Read & write birthday cards, messages, grocery lists and letters together.
- Ask questions before, during and after reading (e.g.. What do you think will happen next?)
