## BREAST CANCER AWARENESS

(a message from our Superintendent, Mrs. Weltz)

We believe it is necessary to address a growing concern across our district school board relating to the "I love boobies" campaign. We have engaged in considerable research in this regard and have taken a firm position as a senior team. We have learned that this campaign is not affiliated with the Canadian Breast Cancer Society, nor committed in any way to research for a cure. Each of us have felt the effects of cancer as we share in the fight with family members, friends, and neighbours. Some of us have even lost a loved one to this disease. We strongly believe in supporting cancer research and awareness in our school communities, but think that the "I love boobies" campaign is degrading and inappropriate in a Catholic school setting. There are alternate ways for staff and students to acknowledge breast cancer awareness. We must foster Catholic communities that are respectful to women and who nurture a sense of genuine understanding of how we can all be well informed about methods of prevention, early detection, coping and support. Many schools have already taken a firm stance with this campaign, fully banning any related paraphernalia as part of the school dress code.

We appreciate your understanding and support in this regard and expect that the "I love boobies" campaign will not be endorsed in your local Catholic schools. Should you have any concerns or questions in this regard, please do not hesitate to contact me.

#### **WASTE FREE LUNCH**

The JK/K French Immersion, 1 / 2 French Immersion and the 5/6 English classes just

finished participating in the Waste Free Lunch Challenge sponsored by Metro and The Ontario Recycling Council. Students initially weighed their lunch waste (organic, recyclables, garbage) and then took to the challenge of reducing the overall weight, day by day, for a full week. Using Tupperware, Ziplocs and reusable drink containers and cutting up fruit at home, were just a few ways the children helped reduce their waste. #### **FOCUS ON STUDENT WORK: Gr. 5/6**

Early in October, the Grade 5/6 class participated in Student Vote as part of their Social Studies class. They were a part of some 369,850 students across Ontario, to cast a ballot. The class elected an NDP majority government. Students learned about each candidate and each party's platform in the weeks leading up to the election on October 6. The students cast their ballots in a 'real' polling station setting, following all the voting guidelines. The hope of Student Vote is that by giving our young population the opportunity and experience to vote with other students across Canada, that when they turn 18 they will make a difference and continue to vote.
