My emotions are always a little mixed when I bring my two children to the first day of school. The joys of summer are past, the intensity of life is picking up, and I am letting my children go into a large school with hundreds of other children. Will they be okay? Will they be happy or lonely? Will they feel safe and cared for? Like many other parents I know, my hope is that I will be able to accompany my children through their school year in as affirming, intimate, and helpful a manner as possible.

The Catholic school system understands that it does not educate children by itself. Instead, it sees itself as part of what is often called the 'Triad', which includes the school, the Church (including our faith tradition and local parish community), and the parents. In my experience, however, it can sometimes be difficult to know how to be involved in my children's education outside of helping with homework! A school is a busy place and it is not always easy to visit casually with teachers and principals while waiting for an invitation from them to participate in the school. Membership on a Catholic School Council is always an option, but this does not suit all parents' visions of how they hope to be involved in the life of their child's school.

As a parent, I have found that the best way to begin is to know what is happening on the school and class calendar. Then, with some intentional communication with the principal and classroom teacher, it is possible to become involved through volunteering at these school and classroom events. I encourage parents to consider this avenue. Parental involvement strengthens the link between the school and the community, allows for more talent and ability to be present in our schools, and is a wonderful

way to model to students the place parents can have in the life of children. A busy school cannot always strengthen the 'Triad' on its' own, it needs people from the parent and parish community who will patiently look for opportunities to step into the life of the school.

I hope that all of you, students, parents, teachers, support staff and administrators, will have a wonderful school year filled with many blessings.
