

2) Smudging to cleanse yourself and your area.



MOOSE HIDE CAMPAIGN DAY TAKE ACTION! MAY 15, 2025








Dance Fachine and St. Anne's School

Chad Solomon - Rabbit and Pear Paws @ St. Jerome




Rabbit and Bear Paws are heroes that we created to share humorous adventures based on Traditional Teachings. This allows us to carry on the teachings to the youth who wish to explore their roots, while helping to share the wisdom of the Aboriginal community with the universal audience (non-aboriginal). The Anishinabek were the middlemen of the Fur trading era. So the Anishinabek would have traveled and traded with other Nations the same goods that they traded with the French and the English.
